I. Learning Objectives

The objective of this course is:

- LO-2. Intends to build in students a critical lens about the use and impact of public speaking in not just literary settings but also social settings, which allow for building a discourse on social concerns.

III. Course Content

UNIT - 1: Basics of public speaking, its relevance and use in public discourse

- 4. Why are we attempting to create a practice of public speaking? What relevance does it hold for us in our individual journeys?
- 5. What are the various patterns and norms of the popular public speaking competitions such as debate, extempore and elocution?
- 6. Is a speech made of content only?

UNIT - 2: Diving deep into the details of speech writing/patterns of tone, non-verbal communication and narrative building

- 1. What makes for a strong speech?
- 2. How does one own a speech while delivering it?
- 3. What are the criteria to look for in a powerful speech?
- 4. What is the role of non-verbal communication in public speaking and public politics? How do we use it to our advantage?
- 5. What is narrative building? How does one build an argument through their speech, such that a narrative is influenced?
- 6. What are some of the ways to build a strong argument? How does one organise thought and build research?
